

2021 SEASON RECAP









In the 2021, the Big Train amassed an offensive record not previously seen. Combine that with an excellent pitching staff and it was no surprise the team marched to its fifth consecutive League championship.

The team's .306 batting average is the highest in team history. The team also set five league records for team offensive performance, including On Base Percentage (.448), Slugging Percentage (.467), OPS (.915), Runs Scored (343), and Runs Per Game (9.80). Yes, on average they scored nearly ten runs per game! What a fun team to watch!


The leader in helping to get to these numbers was Kemp Alderman (Mississippi). Alderman drove in 47 runs, the second highest total in team history trailing only current Milwaukee Brewer Hunter Renfroe's (Mississippi State) 53 RBI in 2012. But Alderman accomplished his total in only 25 games. On a per game basis, Alderman set a new team record with 1.88 RBI per game compared to Renfroe's 1.47 per game. Alderman was paired with Matt Thomas (William & Mary), the league's offensive player of the year, who hit .350, scored 34 runs, and drove in 32 runs in 31 games.

Regular Season

After the Covid-induced hiatus of the 2020 summer, the Big Train eagerly jumped into the 2021 season with its first game against the Gaithersburg Giants on June 7. Its fourth batter, Rocco Peppi (Long Beach State), became the 500th player to wear the Big Train uniform in a league game and Bethesda dominated the game, 12-6, with Austin Gauthier (Hofstra), Nolan Schanuel (Florida Atlantic), and Matt Thomas each contributing two RBI. Ryan Metz (Virginia Tech) hurled 2.1 innings of shutout ball to close out the contest.

Big Train would continue winning through its home opener on

June 9. It was another lopsided victory, this time 12-5 over the South County Braves. Peppi drove in three with a homer and a double. Kyle Velazquez (St. Mary's CA) hit two doubles and stole two bases. Matt Howat (William & Mary) earned the win by pitching four innings without yielding any earned runs. Following a loss to the Alexandria Aces on June 12, the Big Train took off on a six-game winning streak. Over that period, they outscored their opponents, 73-18. On June 13, Bethesda whipped the Gaithersburg Giants, 14-5, as Matt Thomas went 3/4 with a walk. On June 15, the Big Train crushed the South County Braves, 15-3, with a huge contribution from Kemp Alderman, who drove in five runs. Showing no mercy, Bethesda was back at it against the Braves the next day and thrashed them 16-0. Darius Foster (San Francisco) had three hits and stole four bases. Kemp Alderman drove in another four runs. Matt Bedford (Notre Dame) started the game and earned the win with four innings of shutout ball for the seven-inning contest. On June 16, the Big Train bested the Thunderbolts 10-3 and 12-3 in a doubleheader. Starter Luke Baker (Jacksonville) hurled an impressive four innings, yielding only one run, to keep the first game in hand until the bats picked up. The second game was tied, 3-3, going into the ninth until

Darius Foster led off and manufactured the winning run. He singled, stole second, and scored on a single by the next batter. The inning exploded, and the Big Train scored nine runs, but Foster's was the lead run that held up through the end of the game. On June 17, Big Train edged the D.C. Grays, 6-4, in the only close contest during the streak. Bethesda dominated most of the game, leading 5-0 heading into the eighth. Noah Carbajal (Long Beach State) started the game and earned the win. Ryan Lynch (Notre Dame) hurled a shutout inning in relief. Grant Knipp (Alabama) had one of his best days, going 2/3 and Matt Thomas homered. The Grays scored four runs in the last two innings, but Rocco Peppi homered to tally one more run for Big Train and Jesse Barron (San Francisco) held on to earn the save.

The Big Train lost to the Gaithersburg Giants on June 18, 6-4, and then began another six-game winning streak. On June 19, they beat the Alexandria Aces in a doubleheader, 13-1 and 8-4. In the first game, Ryley Johnson (East Carolina) led off and went 3/4. Luke Baker pitched one-hit, one-run ball for four innings, and Cooper Rons (UC Santa Barbara) threw the other three innings yielding one hit and no runs. In the second game, Trevor Doyle (Sacramento State) went 2/3 and scored two runs. Grayson Hitt (Alabama) earned the win with four shutout innings. On June 20, Big Train bats were on display again as the team beat the Thunderbolts, 18-5. It was another five-RBI day for Alderman. Austin Gauthier and Keith Torres (Sacramento State) had three RBI apiece. Jack Cone (William & Mary) hit his seventh double of the year. On June 23, the Big Train crunched the D.C. Grays, 13-1. Rocco Peppi starred in the game with two homers and five RBI. Jake Eddington (Alabama) started the game and allowed only one run in three innings. Zach Locke (Long Beach State) was credited with the win with two shutout innings. Everett Catlett (Georgetown) and Josh Grosz (East Carolina) took the mound for short, but effective, stints. On

June 24, Big Train bested the Gaithersburg Giants, 7-4. Starter Brock Guffey (Alabama) hurled an impressive four innings, giving up only a single hit and no runs. On June 25, Bethesda was the winner over the Alexandria Aces, 5-2. The pitching quartet of Grayson Hitt, Noah Carbajal, Matt Howat, and Jesse Barron kept the Aces at bay.

After a loss to the Thunderbolts on June 26, the Big Train won four of the next five heading into the Fourth of July break. On June 27, they edged the Grays, 9-7, as Brady Gumpf (Notre Dame) had a big day, going 4/4. On June 29, Danny Neri (Notre Dame) scored the winning run in the bottom of the 10th on a Jack Cone sacrifice fly to give Big Train a 7-6 win over the Braves. The next day, Bethesda beat the Braves again, 17-2, as Kemp Alderman drove in six, and the trio of Brock Guffey, Jack Braley (Christopher Newport) and Josh Grosz sparkled on the mound. The 14 Big Train runs in the 8th inning constituted a team record for runs in one inning. The Giants beat the Big Train, 5-1, on July 2, but the Big Train rebounded to beat the Thunderbolts, 4-2, the next day.

The Big Train started the second half of the season slowly, splitting the first two games. They beat the Grays, 6-3, on July 6, and lost to the Braves, 14-7, the next day. Then they took off, winning six of their next seven games -- all by wide margins. On July 8, they beat the Giants, 9-1. Grant Knipp (Alabama) contributed a double and two RBI.

Chris Bookhultz (Maryland) closed out the ninth with a hitless and scoreless outing. On July 10, the Big Train whipped the Grays in both ends of a doubleheader, 16-3 and 10-1. In the first game, Matt Thomas drove in seven, and Kyle Robinson (Texas Tech) registered the win. In the nightcap, Ryley Johnson and Keith Torres each drove in three runs, and Matt Bedford threw five masterful innings of no-hit ball. The seven-inning game was completed as a nohitter, with Bookhultz and Locke hurling the final two innings. On July 11, Big Train trounced the Braves, 15-3. Austin






Gauthier had a perfect day at the plate, hitting a homer and a triple, and taking three walks, while scoring four runs. Grant Knipp went 4/5 and drove in three runs. The Thunderbolts beat Bethesda on July 12, and then the Big Train turned around and whipped the Aces, 14-2, the next day. Continuing to dominate the Aces, the Big Train beat them, 17-3, on July 14. Keith Torres went 4/4 in this game and drove in four. On July 15, Big Train lost to the Giants in a squeaker, 3-2. On July 20, Big Train bounced back and walloped the Thunderbolts, 14-1. Nolan Schanuel was the big hitter in that game, going 3/4 with four RBI. The regular season ended with a doubleheader split with the Grays on July 21. The Grays took the first game, 7-4. Big Train came from behind in the seventh and final inning of the second game with six runs to edge the Grays, 9-8. A Kemp Alderman homer finished it and set off the celebration as Big Train headed into the playoffs as the regular season champs.

League Semifinals

As the #1 seed in the playoffs, Bethesda sat for a bye in the first round. The last place D.C. Grays beat the Gaithersburg Giants in the first round to earn the right to face the Big Train in the semis. It proved to be a lopsided series. In Game One, Bethesda was already ahead 4-0 by the end of the first inning, partly propelled by a two-



run homer by Nolan Schanuel. At the end of two, it was 6-0, and with the use of his speedy base running, Darius Foster had already scored his second run. In the third, Foster hit a 3-run homer, and that inning ended with Big Train ahead 10-1. Continuing the bombardment, the Big Train scored another three runs in the fourth inning, two of which came on a single by Danny Neri. Grayson Hitt cruised to the win, with Cooper Rons and Matt Howat finishing up for a 14-2 romp. In Game Two, the Big Train got off to a first inning lead again, but it was not as pronounced. Ryley Johnson and Matt Thomas got on base and after a double steal of second and third, Grant Knipp drove them in with a single to give his team a 2-0 lead. Nolan Schanuel led off the second with a single, and advanced around the bases to score on a single, a walk, and a double play. The Grays answered with a run in the bottom of the second to make the score 3-1. Big Train opened things up in the fourth inning with five runs. The big hit was a three-run triple by Ryley Johnson. Big Train scored two in the top of the fifth, matched by two by the Grays in the bottom of the inning. The Grays scored their fourth and final run in the seventh. Big Train notched another pair of runs in the eighth. They closed

out the game with two more in the ninth. Ryley Johnson singled to score Colin Tuft (Virginia) and Christian Martin (Virginia Tech) singled to score Brady Gumpf. Matt Bedford hurled five innings while yielding only one run. The final score was 14-4.

League Championship Series

The Alexandria Aces entered the playoffs as the #2 seed. In the semifinals, they topped the Thunderbolts, 4-1 and 10-0. It was clear that the league's top two teams were meeting for the championship.

Game One was held at Povich Field on July 29. Jake Eddington was sent to the mound for the Big Train and was on his game from the start. He would throw four innings and yield only one hit and no runs. In the meantime, the offense went to work. In the first inning, Darius Foster singled, stole a couple of bases, and scored on a wild pitch. Grant Knipp walked, advanced to second on a wild pitch, and scored on a single. In the second, Rocco Peppi hit a home run to extend the lead to 3-0. Nolan Schanuel led off the fourth with a single and scored on a Keith Torres double. Luke Baker took over on the mount in the fifth and would toss three innings to earn the win. In the bottom of the fifth, Matt Thomas reached on a single, advanced on an error, and scored an unearned run on a single by Grant Knipp. In the sixth, Keith Torres scored a run after slamming a double. The final run for Big Train came in the eighth as Trevor Doyle homered. At this point, the score was 7-0. The Aces managed to tally two runs in the ninth, but they fell short, and the Big Train took Game One 7-2.

The next day, Game Two was played at Frank Mann Field in Alexandria. Again, Manager Sal Colangelo chose a pitcher ready to come through for the team. This time it was Josh Grosz. Josh pitched six innings of shutout ball, striking out nine. It took a little longer for the Big Train bats to get going in this game. At the end of one, the game was scoreless, but the Aces came close to scoring. Behind two hits and a Big Train error, they had runners on first and second. Then came a single through the infield. Jack Cone fielded it and pegged it to catcher Danny Neri, who tagged the Aces runner at home plate to end the inning and squelch the rally. In the second, Kemp Alderman singled, Nolan Schanuel struck out, Rocco Peppi singled, moving Alderman to second. Trevor Doyle singled to right field and while Alderman was out at the plate, Peppi kept coming and scored to give the Big Train the lead. In the third inning, Darius Foster got aboard on an error and moved to third base on a passed ball and a wild pitch and eventually scored on a sacrifice fly. Jack Cone walked and scored on a two-run homer by Kemp Alderman. Those three runs gave Big Train a 4-0 lead, which the pitching staff would hold up. Ryan Daugherty (St. Mary's CA) pitched the final three innings for Big Train and blanked the Grays with no hits. Once again, for the fifth consecutive time, the Big Train were the champions of the Cal Ripken Collegiate Baseball League.





Luke Adkins, named to the Ripken League All League Team in all three of his Big Train seasons, now serves as head baseball coach at Starkville High School in Mississippi. Becky Crowley serves on the board of directors of the Bethesda Community Base Ball Club and as treasurer of the Ripken League.

Now a member of the Milwaukee Brewers, Hunter Renfroe led the Big Train to a national championship in 2011 and shattered Ripken League hitting records in 2012.

Big Train manager Sal Colangelo, Brian Dozier (BT 2006/Southern Mississippi), and Big Train founder Bruce Adams were three members of the 2019 inaugural class of the Ripken League Hall of Fame along with Cal Ripken Senior, Youse's Maryland Orioles Manager Dean Albany, and Thunderbolts hurler Brett Cecil.

The Ripken League Hall of Fame plaques are displayed on the back of the first base grandstand at Povich Field.








HUNTER RENFROE played for the Bethesda Big Train in 2011 and 2012. In 2011, he hit .305 with eight home runs and 30 RBIs while leading the Ripken League champion Big Train team that was named the nation's top summer college team by Perfect Game USA. In 2012, he shattered Ripken League hitting records with a slugging percentage of .866, 16 home runs, 53 RBIs, 47 runs scored, and 116 total bases. In 2012, the Big Train retired his #11. Hunter played baseball at Mississippi State University and was the thirteenth player selected in the 2013 Major League Baseball Draft. Drafted by the San Diego Padres, he was named the 2016 MVP of the Pacific Coast League. Hunter hit 89 home runs in three full seasons with the Padres. In 2020, he played for the American League champion Tampa Bay Rays. In December 2020, he signed with the Boston Red Sox.

BRIAN DOZIER played for the 2006 Cal Ripken Collegiate Baseball League regular season champion Bethesda Big Train, batting .258 with 31 hits in 33 games as shortstop. Brian played baseball at the University of Southern Mississippi and was selected by the Minnesota Twins in the eighth round of the 2009 Major League Baseball Draft. He made his major league debut on May 7, 2012. In 2015, Brian became the 16th player to hit a home run in his first Major League All-Star Game at bat. In 2016, he became the first American League second baseman to hit 40 home runs in a season. By the end of the 2018 season, Brian had 172 career home runs in the major leagues. He received the Gold Glove Award at second base in 2017. Brian received the Twins Heart and Hustle Award from the Major League Baseball Players Alumni Association in 2014 and 2015.






SHIRLEY & WALTER: TOGETHER AGAIN

On a gorgeous and festive Saturday morning November 6, 2021, members of the families of Shirley Povich and Walter Johnson joined with Montgomery Parks officials, County elected leaders, and Bethesda Community Base Ball Club leaders past and present to dedicate sculptures of two of Washington's most iconic sports figures. The sculptures of journalist Shirley Povich, for whom our ballpark is named, and Walter Johnson, whose Big Train nickname our team carries with pride, were crafted by Toby Mendez, the sculptor who turned the legends of Birdland into bronze at Camden Yards.

Big Train co-founder John Ourisman envisioned Shirley Povich Field as "a living history museum" educating future generations about famed *Washington Post* sportswriter Shirley Povich and baseball Hall of Famer Walter Johnson. Large, colorful biographical murals of Povich and Johnson have greeted visitors as they enter Povich Field since our very first game on June 4, 1999.


At the November 6 dedication ceremony, Bethesda Community Base Ball Club founder and president Bruce Adams introduced Toby Mendez as "a nationally recognized sculptor with a spectacular portfolio focused on civil rights and sports." Mendez noted "this work of art brings civil rights and sports together." Mendez quoted one of his most celebrated subjects, Thurgood Marshall, as saying that a hero is someone who when they have a voice, they use it. "Shirley," Mendez said, "prodded and provoked Major League Baseball to desegregate. He

prodded and provoked the Washington football club to do the right thing and integrate. So, he's my hero."

Former Washington Post sports editor George Solomon spoke about his colleague Shirley Povich and was presented with a replica plaque for the newly named George Solomon Press Box: "Shirley Povich would have loved Povich Field and all it stands for. He loved baseball, and he loved baseball at its roots, which is what this is." ESPN's Tim Kurkjian, a living baseball encyclopedia, pronounced Walter Johnson "the greatest pitcher ever. There is not a close second." Tim received a replica of the Tim Kurkjian Sports Journalism Fellows (aka Big Train summer interns) plaque that will also be displayed near the door to the Solomon Press Box.

Walter Johnson's grandson and biographer Hank Thomas pointed out that "this scene (of Shirley Povich interviewing Walter Johnson) undoubtedly took place countless times." Hank recalled, as many Washingtonians have over the years, that he learned to read by reading Shirley Povich's columns each morning.

Shirley Povich's son Maury concluded the dedication by saying that if his father would have been given a choice to sit next to anyone other than family for eternity, it would have been Walter Johnson. Maury explained that his father believed Johnson was "the most honest, the most humble, and the most humane of any athlete he had ever been around." This is really saying something as Povich covered athletes for 75 years from Ruth to Ripken.

BIG TRAIN COMMUNITY HEROES

The Bethesda Community Base Ball Club (BCBBC) has always been about more than baseball. Our founding mission was to improve opportunities for youth.

From 1999 to 2011, we made \$600,000 worth of improvements to youth baseball and softball fields from Germantown to Anacostia. Big Train baseball helped the Cal Ripken Collegiate Baseball League collect 60,846 pounds of food for the Manna Food Center from 2010 to 2019.

For eleven seasons from 2009 to 2019, with the support of the Jim and Carol Trawick Foundation, Bethesda Big Train provided local nonprofit organizations with 100 free tickets each and an opportunity to showcase their organizations to Big Train fans. Over those eleven seasons, more than 400 local nonprofits benefitted from the Nonprofits of the Night program.

When we retook stewardship of Big Train in 2020, we honored five Big Train Community heroes and donated \$2,500 to the Manna Food Center and \$1,400 to Nourishing Bethesda.

In response to challenges due to the covid pandemic, we transitioned to a program of hosting community heroes from a different nonprofit at each Big Train home game. We dedicated our 2021 Big Train season to the community heroes

-- the nurses, community nonprofits, first responders, doctors, grocery store clerks, and others -- who worked so tirelessly on the frontlines during the pandemic. "These are the folks who helped us through these challenging times," explained Big Train founder Bruce Adams. "They deserve some fun."

At each Big Train home game during the 2021 season, we honored 25 Frontline Community Heroes with a free ticket to the game and a dinner and a drink thanks to the generous support provided by the Jim and Carol Trawick Foundation, The Sebrechts Family, and Melanie Folstad, RBC Wealth Management. Thanks to these generous sponsors, nearly 500 frontline community heroes were treated to a night at the ballpark with dinner from our wonderful food providers at Gregorio's Trattoria and Catalyst Hot Dogs. The Frontline Heroes from Nourishing Bethesda are shown in the photo below being applauded by the Big Train fans during our June 20 game. ISRAEL-BETHESDA FRIENDSHIP GAME

TEAM ISRAEL PREPS FOR OLYMPICS AT POVICH FIELD





It was standing room only at Shirley Povich Field for the Israel-Bethesda Friendship Game on July 18, 2021 when the Big Train hosted the Olympic-bound Israel National Baseball Team. Just days before departing for Japan, former major leaguers Ian Kinsler, Ty Kelly, Ryan Lavarnway, and Danny Valencia faced off against the Big Train. The Big Train took a 7-5 lead into the last inning, but Team Israel won a dramatic come from behind victory. Team Israel split two exhibition games with Ripken League All Stars, winning at FNB Field in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania and losing at Ripken Stadium in Aberdeen, Maryland.

After a pre-game ceremony that featured remarks from Tammy Ben Haim, Minister for Public Diplomacy of the Embassy of Israel, and Peter Kurz, general manager of Team Israel, Big Train slugger Grant Kipp treated the standing room only crowd of 835 to a home run in the second inning. Playing the third inning under international rules, both teams started with runners on first and second. Ian

Kinsler had an RBI double and scored on a single by Ty Kelly. Kelly also scored, as did a third run to give Team Israel the lead at 3-1. In the bottom of the third, Bethesda's Danny

Neri scored on a sacrifice fly. In the top of the fourth, Team Israel scored a run to pad its lead to 4-2. In the top of the fifth, Danny Valencia scored for Israel. Big Train answered in the bottom of the inning with two runs, bringing the score to 5-4. Christian Martin hit a double to bring in Brady Gumpf and Martin scored on a single by Trevor Doyle. In the bottom of the sixth, the Big Train scored three runs and pulled ahead, 7-5. Nolan Schanuel and Colin Tuft led off the inning by getting on base. After the next two Big Train batters failed to advance them, Ryley Johnson drove them in with a ground rule double. Then Johnson stole third and scored on an error by the catcher. In the seventh and final inning, the Big Train

gave up three runs, none of them earned. Israel's Nick Rickles reached first on an error and scored on a two-run homer by Robb Paller. One more unearned run came in, and Team Israel led 8-7 going into the bottom of seventh and last inning. The Big Train had one more chance, and got two men on base via walks, but could not score.

With support from our partners at the International Jewish Sports Foundation, Jewish Community Relations Council, Bender JCC of Greater Washington, The Jewish Federation, *Washington Jewish Week*, and the Embassy of Israel, the Friendship Game was a true celebration of community. Importantly, we were able to raise nearly \$30,000 to support Team Israel on its historic trip to the Olympics.





HIDDEN DIAMONDS

For Montgomery County's Black communities, sandlot baseball was a big hit

THERE ARE NO HINTS at the Cabin John Village shopping center in Potomac or at the Walgreens on Hungerford Drive in Rockville that crowds used to watch baseball games on the land now occupied by those buildings. Growing up in Montgomery County in the 1950s as a baseball-crazy kid, I didn't have a clue that some of the country's finest ballplayers were playing at ballfields just miles from my house in Potomac.

In the second half of the 19th century, when four of every 10 Montgomery

County residents were Black, formerly enslaved people founded more than three dozen communities throughout the county. These historic Black communities were isolated and often denied public services. Over the years, some were ignored, others were bulldozed. For many of them, "history is buried with the people," says the Rev. Tim Warner of Emory Grove United Methodist Church in Gaithersburg.

Along with churches and schools, baseball became the center of civic life in these communities from the 1940s through the 1960s. Many of them—from Emory Grove to Lyttonsville and Scotland to Sandy Spring—organized sandlot teams, according to my research for "In Search of the Ballfields of Montgomery's Black Communities," a 2021 presentation for the nonprofit Montgomery History.

"Baseball was the entertainment. It started out of necessity," former Sandy Spring player Jim Offord, who died in 2019, said in a County Cable Montgomery documentary that aired in 2000. "It was one of the few places we could go. It didn't take much to get us excited because we didn't have much anyway."

Local baseball historian Billy Gordon, who grew up in Rockville watching the Black sandlot stars play, recalls that the "entire African American community" would turn out. "It was quite a scene," says Gordon, who participated in the Montgomery History presentation. "The preacher would be at the game, and the bootlegger would be there dispensing beverages."

The center of the county's Black sandlot teams was Johnson's Park in Emory Grove. Roughly 1,000 people would show up on Memorial Day for food, fellowship and a twi-night doubleheader. Barnstorming Negro Leagues teams came to the Emory Grove ballpark to take on the county's top sandlot teams: Rockville American Legion Post 151, the Maryland Wildcats and the Sandy Spring All-Stars, according to Gordon.

The ballparks provided entertainment and a place to gather for Black residents, who were blocked from other options because of Jim Crow laws.

Some of Montgomery's best players competed in the Negro Leagues before returning home to join their local sandlot teams and raise their families. Segregation denied them the opportunity to match their skills against the very best, according to Gordon, who lists Russell Awkard, Bill Williams and brothers Clarence "Pint" Isreal and Elbert Isreal as top players.

Black business entrepreneurs and county residents Edward Johnson, Joe Davis, William Wims, Charlie Harris and Buck Bailey saw the success of the Negro Leagues and built ballparks that attracted hundreds of fans. The ballparks provided entertainment and a place to gather for Black residents, who were blocked from other options because of Jim Crow laws.

Johnson's Park and a ballfield in Norbeck with two names—Bailey's and Page's—hosted night games under the lights. Joe Davis' Oak Haven in Boyds had a dance hall and served a full dinner after Sunday games. Wims Meadow in Clarksburg and Harris Meadow in Stewartown drew top crowds on weekends from Memorial Day to Labor Day.

"When you played at night at Johnson's Park, you felt like you were a pro," Eddie Dove, a former Scotland Eagles third baseman, told me. Built in 1947, Johnson's Park is now owned by Montgomery Parks.

As entertainment opportunities for Black residents widened in the 1960s and early '70s, the Black sandlot teams faded away. ■

PINT ISREAL, MONTGOMERY COUNTY'S

Magnificent Mite

He beat out an All-Star second baseman to win a starting job with a Negro League baseball team. He held off a Hall of Fame third baseman from taking away his spot at the hot corner on his Negro League team. He was a starting third baseman in the 1946 Negro League World Series. He was penciled into starting lineups by three managers who now reside in the Hall of Fame. He was a local man who spent nearly his whole life in Rockville. His name was Clarence "Pint" Isreal.

Let's be clear about the spelling of his last name. That's Isreal, not Israel, like the country. Newspapers of the day were confused about it, and out of respect, we wish to state it correctly here.

The earliest years of Clarence Isreal were spent in rural Georgia. He was born in Marietta, Georgia, on February 15, 1918, but his parents, Frank and Violet Isreal, lived on a farm in a place called Big Shanty in an area of Cobb County near Kennesaw. Frank was a sharecropper and railroad worker whose life spanned from 1886 to 1977, and Violet lived from 1891 to 1985; they were wed in 1911. In 1923, Frank and Violet packed up their household and moved to Rockville, Maryland, where they hoped their lives would improve.

Clarence grew up on Stonestreet Avenue in the Lincoln Park neighborhood of Rockville. He attended segregated schools, including Rockville Colored Elementary School, and graduated from Rockville Colored High School in 1935. Unfortunately, to families of color, the city seemed in many ways like a place in the Deep South until well into the mid-century.

After high school, he played sandlot baseball locally around Rockville for a few years. A historical marker in Rockville indicated the first semipro team with which he signed to play was the Washington Royals. The year on the marker is in the process of being revised, but the team seems to be correct. The Washington Royals were a semipro team that traveled up the East Coast to cities such as Rochester, New York, and Trenton, New Jersey, to take on all sorts of local YMCA and other teams. Clarence's nephew, Jackie Smith, believes Clarence joined the Washington Royals in 1938. Then he began playing at a higher level of semipro ball with the Washington Royal Giants in 1939. The Royal Giants played in Griffith Stadium, the same ballpark as the American League's Washington Senators. The Royal Giants were in the Negro International League, and they were making their debut under that name in 1939. In 1938, the team had been known as the Washington Black Senators.

Clarence was a fine ballplayer. His Royal Giants manager, Ben Taylor, who had been a premier player in the Negro Leagues and who would be inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006, described Clarence as "another Dandridge." The reference was to Ray Dandridge, who had a hallof-fame career as a third baseman and who was generally considered, along with Judy Johnson, one of the two best Negro League third sackers. Later, Clarence Isreal and Ray Dandridge became teammates on the Newark Eagles, and Clarence was the one who held down the third-base spot. That's how good Clarence was. After his death, the Montgomery Journal reported that scouts had said about Clarence: "You just can't get anything past him at third."

Clarence was generally known by his nickname "Pint," which came from his diminutive size. According to the website of the Cobb County (Georgia) Hall of Fame, of which Clarence is an honored member, he was 5-foot-5. Seamheads.com confirms that. Originally, the nickname was "Half Pint," but it was shortened as

people verbalized it and used it with more frequency.


In 1940, Pint made his debut in the Negro Leagues with the Newark Eagles and was positioned at second base as one-half of the keystone combination with future majorleaguer Buzz Clarkson. He took over from 12-year veteran second baseman Dick Seay, as the 1940 Eagles manager Dick Lundy announced on July 29 that Isreal had been doing such terrific work as an understudy that he deserved the top job. According to James Riley's The Biographical Encyclopedia of The Negro Baseball Leagues, although never a spectacular hitter, Seay had been the best defensive second baseman in the Negro Leagues during the decade of the 1930's, so Isreal had beaten out somewhat of a legend.

Pint had a highly successful rookie season, batting .294 with 32 hits in 32 games, with an on-base percentage of .347. He hit four homers, scored 28 runs, and drove in 22 runs.

As 1941 began, Pint moved over to third base so Hall of Fame pitcher Leon Day could play second during those games when he wasn't on the mound. Newspapers praised Pint's playing with terms like "sparkplug of the infield." Pint came very close to making the East-West All-Star game, falling short by just two percentage points in the voting.

For the 1941 season, Isreal hit .268 with 42 hits in 44 games, with an on-base percentage of .341. He hit two homers, scored 31 runs, and drove in 17 runs while hitting second in the batting order for most of the year.

In 1942, Pint returned to the Eagles and continued to receive praise for his play. He was now under a new manager and another future hall-of-famer, Willie Wells. In late June, the *Washington Evening Star* stated that "Newark is reported to have one of the finest infields in Negro baseball, with (Willie) Wells at short, 'Pint' Israel (sic) at third, Ray Dandridge at second, and Lenny Pearson at first." Isreal's batting average declined, but he had a solid season. He hit .208 with 30 hits and 19 walks in 42 games, scored 24 runs, and drove in another 15 from the lead-off spot in the lineup that year. As the summer proceeded, he unfortunately lost his draft exemption and, on August 18, reported for induction into the Army.



Having completed his military service, he returned to the Newark Eagles in 1946. He would be playing for Biz Mackey, his third hall-of-fame manager. In the season's first game, played in Newark on May 7, Isreal's teammate Leon Day tossed a no-hitter. The game was a pitchers' duel and scoreless until the sixth inning, when Pint hit a triple to rightcenter and subsequently scored as the Eagles beat the Philadelphia Stars and Barney Brown, 2-0. Brown gave up

only six hits that day, Pint had two of them.

The most important game of the 1946 season for Pint and the Eagles took place on September 4. That was the day the Eagles clinched the National League championship, assuring a spot in the Negro League World Series. The Eagles won that game 17-5 over the Cuban Stars. Pint had two hits – both doubles, according to the newspaper write-up – and scored four runs. The account in the *Indianapolis Recorder* cited future hall-of-famer Larry Doby as the leading Eagles contributor with five hits in the game, but Pint was the second offensive player mentioned.

In the Negro League World Series of 1946, the Eagles faced the Kansas City Monarchs. In Game One, Pint was the starting third baseman for the Eagles. He had one at-bat before he was injured chasing a foul pop off the bat of Herb Souell into the field boxes along the third-base line. He ended up dislocating his knee and did not make another appearance until Game Five, played in Chicago's Comiskey Park. In that game, he was once again the starting third sacker, and he hit a single in three official at-bats. That was the only contest of the World Series in which Pint played the entire game.

Going into Game Six, the Eagles were down in the series three games to two and were desperate for a win. One more loss and the Monarchs would have been champions. Pint started the game at third base, managed to get a walk in the first inning, and moved around the bases to score the Eagles' first run. The Monarchs took a 5-0 lead in the top of the first, but by the time the inning was over, the lead narrowed to 5-4. The Eagles ended



up winning by a final score of 9-7. The two-run edge was slim, so every run was important, and Pint had made a significant contribution. The victory enabled the Eagles to advance to Game Seven, which they won, although Isreal did not play.

1947 was Pint's final year in the Negro Leagues. He spent it with the Homestead Grays. Although his batting average dwindled to .206, he was playing regularly, so his defensive skills were still valued by the manager. Only five players on the team had more plate appearances than Pint. With Jackie Robinson having broken the color barrier in the major leagues that season, Pint could foresee the demise of the Negro Leagues, and he didn't want to start over again in the minors of affiliated baseball. So, he retired.

In the post-Negro Leagues phase of his life, he became an outstanding individual in another sense. He was a strong community leader who was devoted to the cause of helping to steer youth in the right direction. He was the co-founder of the Black Angels Boys Club, which served lads from all over Montgomery County. He gave his time to all sorts of organizations, such as Head Start, FISH, Big Brothers, and his church. He was the player/manager of the first integrated baseball team in Montgomery County – the NIH Baseball Team. And he was the mentor for numerous youths interested in sports.


Pint died in 1987. In 1988, the Mayor and Council of Rockville dedicated a city park in his honor. It is in the Lincoln Park community in Rockville. In 2019, Pint was inducted into the inaugural class of the Rockville Baseball Hall of Fame.



Strengthening Our Fan-First Culture of Service

When Rachel Northridge was in high school, she spent a summer on the Big Train High School Leadership Council organized by Big Train general manager Alex Thompson. Now, Rachel is Monumental Sports and Entertainment's senior manager of client services managing suites for two hundred plus events each year at Capital One Arena. And she is a member of the governing board of our Bethesda Community Base Ball Club.

Patrick Chapman started volunteering at Big Train games when he was in middle school. Starting as a volunteer in the Povich Field team store, Patrick took on a number of game night operations jobs over the years and helped with community events beyond the ballpark. In 2021, he was named assistant general manager and given responsibility for managing online ticket sales as the Big Train moved from general admission seating to sales of specific seats in response to the covid challenge. Patrick is a rising junior at George Mason University pursuing an economics degree while playing on the ice hockey team.

The small town charm of Big Train baseball at Povich Field is a rarity in the hustle and bustle of a busy urban-suburban place like Montgomery County. We think a key to keeping this small town charm is attracting talented young people when they are in middle school and teaching them our Big Train fan friendly, customer service culture. I remember my co-founder John Ourisman once observing in our early years of Big Train, "I'll bet if all the adults left their volunteer positions to watch the game, the middle school students could run the place." I have never been quite sure if he was kidding or not. But I do remember fondly all the parents over the years who have thanked me for introducing their children to community service through their volunteer work at Povich Field.

To make sure this fan-first culture of service to others continues as the core value of our Big Train organization, we are bringing back the high school leadership program this summer with six Alexander DiMisa High School Leadership Fellows – Alex Chang (Walter Johnson), Robert Hsu (Walter Johnson), Henry Leggett (Landon), Bronwyn McNulty (Whitman), Jack Sherbacow (Bullis), and Jack Stashower (Walter Johnson). For twelve years, starting at the age of five, Alex DiMisa was a Big Train volunteer working to enrich the experience of Big Train fans of all ages. We are proud to name our leadership program in honor of his life of service and heroism.

From the East: Take the Beltway (I-495) west toward Bethesda. Take Exit 35 onto I-270 North toward Frederick. Go 1.7 miles and take Exit 1B for Rockledge Drive. Turn left, and then turn right to stay on Rockledge Drive. Turn right on Westlake Terrace. Turn right on Westlake Drive, and make your second left into Cabin John Regional Park.

From the North: Take I-270 South to Exit 4B for Montrose Road West. Turn left on Seven Locks Road. Turn left on Tuckerman Lane. Turn right on Westlake Drive, and after the power lines, the entrance to Cabin John Regional Park is on your right.



From Virginia: Take the Beltway (I-495) north, and stay left at the I-270 split to head north toward Frederick. Take Exit 1 for Democracy Boulevard, keep left at the split, and turn left. After Westfield Montgomery, turn right on Westlake Drive. Go 0.5 miles and the entrance to Cabin John Regional Park is on your left.

From Povich Field (20.6 miles): Take I-270 south and merge with the Beltway (I-495) south. Cross the Potomac River and take Exit 43 for the George Washington Memorial Parkway. Head south for 10 miles and take the exit toward Arlington Cemetery. Turn left onto Memorial Drive and then take an immediate right onto VA 110 south ramp to US 1 south. Take US 1 south for about 3.5 miles, and turn right on East Reed Avenue. Turn right onto Commonwealth Avenue, and the ballpark is on your left.


